A blast of hot air hit Saskatoon a little over a week ago and drove the ice off the South Saskatchewan River. Paddlers are getting back on the water. Prairie crocuses are poking up along the City's Meewasin Trail. Pelican Watch contestants are keeping a close eye on the weir for signs of the first early-bird pelican to land. All signs point to spring's arrival and time to launch a new canoeing season!

CanoeSki is launching the season with a replay of a canoeing-related activity: our navigation course taking place in the "wilds" around Saskatoon. This *almost* new program was a rip-roarin' success last year, so it's coming again in mid-May. The GPS has not made the map & compass obsolete, only more intriguing. So what is really new? Saskatchewan's centennial is and an ambitious group of paddlers are celebrating in historic canoeing style. CanoeSki is helping sponsor the Canadian Parks & Wilderness Society's team in the Centennial Canoe Quest -- a 31-team, 1000 km marathon race down the Churchill River in fur trade style voyageur canoes.

Speaking of the Churchill River, a not so new threat is becoming increasingly imminent -- logging in the watershed with no protection for the river in place. This is an abhorrent prospect, indeed, a potential desecration of one of the most significant and most beautiful heritage waterways in the world. On a positive note, a couple of <u>delightful stories</u> about canoeing the Churchill River came out of the Women & Waves tour last August.
